The emphasis on lifelong learning:



New Jersey Student Earns Bachelor's Degree in PTA to Stand Out in the Field



MERIBETH BROOKMAN of New Jersey completed her Bachelor of Science in Physical Therapist Assistant (PTA) degree in December 2022. Brookman entered the program to advance her practice and leadership within the physical therapy field.

Brookman currently practices in Piscataway, N.J. and was able to continue her work as a PTA while completing the online program option through the College. Her education began with a degree in Exercise Science, after which she returned to school to earn an Associate's degree in PTA.

"Once I finished school, I was overwhelmed by the exciting start to my new career, but I felt like something was missing," she says. "I felt as though I still had so much left to learn to provide the best care for my patients. So, before I even held my official license in my hand, I had already applied and been accepted

As one of the few institutions in the nation to offer a Bachelor's degree option, Clarkson College can offer professionals like Brookman the opportunity to close the education gap between PTs and PTAs. "People have a preconceived idea when they hear the word 'assistant' and often assume I am just another aide," says Brookman. "Pursuing a degree at Clarkson College was an opportunity to set myself apart from the rest, and hopefully earn the respect we deserve in this profession."

Through the program option, Brookman completed theory coursework online and came to campus three times to complete hands-on training and skills checks. According to her, the knowledge she gained from faculty with experience in the field was invaluable. "The teachers make it a point to get to know you and try their best to help you succeed," she says. "It fosters a team environment and helps students to come along side and push each other to be their very best." Now just a few days away from graduating, Brookman knows that adding the BSPTA credentials behind her name will set her apart from others in the field. "I tell every young student and new PTA that I encounter to start pursuing this Bachelor's degree goal, because it will only make you a better clinician."


IPE Course for External Constituents

Our Interprofessional Education (IPE) team offers continuing education credits (CEUs) through our external IPE course. We offer up to 9.0 contact hours, 9.0 continuing education hours, and 10 continuing education hours for a Physical Therapist/Physical Therapist Assistant home study course. The self-guided, online IPE course can be completed at one's own pace throughout the course of the calendar year, and the course modules are designed to provide excellent instruction of the pillars of IPE (Values/ Ethics for Interprofessional Practice, Roles/Responsibilities, Interprofessional Communication, and Teams/ Teamwork).


Ed.D., PT, DPT, FNAP, joined the Clarkson College Physical Therapist Assistant (PTA) program in 2003. In 2015, she was appointed Vice President of Academic Affairs (VPAA). In this role she supported academic programming, accreditation,

the center for teaching excellence, community advancement, institutional research, academic and clinical compliance, administrative support services, academic travel abroad, interprofessional education, and college finances. She is currently also an associate professor in the PTA program and Doctor of Education (EdD) in Healthcare Education and Leadership, and served from 2007-2015, as the director of the PTA program, at Clarkson College. Her teaching assignments have recently included: Professional Issues, Advanced Procedures in Physical Therapy, Advanced Multiple System Interventions and Care Through the Lifespan, and a Doctoral Seminar course.

Dr. Nebel grew up in Casper, Wyo. and in 1999 earned her Bachelor of Science degree in Health and Human Development from Montana State University–Bozeman. In 2002, she earned her Doctorate in Physical Therapy from Creighton University, and in 2020, she received her Ed.D. in Interdisciplinary Leadership from Creighton University. Her dissertation topic explored the role of political skill in decision-making for resource allocation in higher education, and she continues to pursue scholarly opportunities related to this work. Her clinical background includes pediatrics, outpatient orthopedics, industrial wellness, and







In 2010, Clarkson College awarded Dr. Nebel the Dr. Patricia Book Perry Faculty of the Year Award for her dedication to high standards of education at the College. In 2011, her alma mater, Creighton University, selected her for the Young Alumni Appreciation Award in recognition of her exceptional leadership and devoted service to the profession of physical therapy. She was the Nebraska Physical Therapy Association Achievement in Education Award recipient in 2012, and, in recognition of her dedication to health care-related community service activities, she received the Clarkson College Maltese Cross Award in 2014. In 2018, Dr. Nebel received the honor of a Distinguished Fellow in

Physical Therapy from the National Academies of Practice and in 2022 was selected into the Executive Leadership Academy class for the Council of Independent Colleges. Dr. Nebel is an active member of the American Physical Therapy Association (APTA) and the Education Section. Additionally, she has served as the Nebraska Student Special Interest Group faculty liaison for the Nebraska Physical Therapy Association (NPTA), a Commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education (CAPTE) site reviewer and a PTA Board Exam Preparation course instructor for Therapy Ed. She is also an accreditation site reviewer for the Higher Learning Commission. She is an active member with the Consortium



She was integral in completing an interprofessional collaboration project with Creighton University to create an interprofessional education course for all Clarkson College students, including required interprofessional experiences. Dr. Nebel also recently completed a four-year study with colleagues from Clarkson College and the University of Nebraska Medical Center working to answer the question: "Does a Combined



Student Physical Therapist (PT) and Student Physical Therapist Assistant (PTA) Lab Experience Impact Knowledge and Attitudes Toward Interprofessional Education and Team Training for Patient Safety?" She is continually involved with outreach programs to fight childhood obesity, improve the quality of life through exercise, balance assessment, and fall prevention with neurologically involved patients, and a variety of other community-based wellness and health interprofessional education programs. Radiography and Medical Imaging Program Launches New Certificate Options

The Clarkson College Radiography and Medical Imaging program recently launched four new certificate options for professionals in the medical imaging field. The 12-credit hour options can be completed 100% online in as few as two semesters.

Professionals can choose from four specialties.

- Certificate in Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI): Allows for career advancement in the medical imaging profession through certificate in the MRI field.
- Certificate in Computed Tomography (CT): Prepare to work or complete an externship in the CT field.
- Certificate in Cardiac and Vascular Interventional: Provides foundational didactic knowledge of the advanced vascular and cardiac interventional radiography modalities.
- Certificate in Leadership in Medical Imaging: Prepare for leadership and supervisory roles in a variety of health care and medical imaging settings.

Following completion of the MRI, CT and cardiac and vascular interventional options, students will be equipped for the clinical components needed to fulfill the requirements of the American Registry of Registered Technologists (ARRT) post-primary certification. Clarkson College is proud to give back to the children and families in the neighborhood with the installation of a Free Little Library located in the Clarkson Park at 42nd and Dodge Streets. The College worked with community partners including MCL Construction, RDG Planning and Design, and Renze to create and build a unique and sustainable Little Library to play a part in helping youth gain access to and own books at an early age. According to the National Commission on Reading in 1985, the single most significant factor influencing a child's early educational success is an introduction to books and being read to at home prior to beginning school. Clarkson College, along with its community partners, hopes this Little Library is the first of many so more children have the opportunity to begin their school year ready to learn.

"When we were deciding where we wanted to install our first Little Library, we instantly thought of the Clarkson Park. It bears the Clarkson name and is located across the street from the College, which makes it a perfect fit," shared Jina Paul, Vice President of Operations & Student Affairs at Clarkson College.

The installment includes a fourtiered box unit that house children's books for youth in the neighborhood to take home and enjoy. Clarkson College donates books by holding book drives and maintaining the unit to ensure it stays clean and safe. The installation also features a curved bench for children and family members to sit and read a book together. The College hopes the neighborhood enjoys not only the books, but also the addition of a beautiful Little Library to the Clarkson Park.




Do You Know Someone Considering A Health Care Career But Are Unsure Which Field To Pursue?


Community Welcomed at Open House

College Launches Doctoral Track in Interprofessional Leadership

anniversaries of the Doctor of Education (Ed.D.) in Healthcare Education & Leadership and Doctor of Nursing Practice programs, Clarkson College is excited to announce the launch of a new doctoral track—the Ed.D. in Interprofessional Leadership. This multidisciplinary option enhances the skill set of current and aspiring leaders in a variety of sectoors, including but not limited to health care, higher education, business, non-profit, and community organization.

Coursework primarily focuses on boundaryspanning leadership to mend or prevent organizational divide and, instead, foster new ways of thinking, working, and collaborating. Crossfunctional alliances and strategies, and leading through change and disruption, are other key pillars of the curriculum.

"Offering the Ed.D. in Interprofessional Education meets the demand for a relevant doctoral program with a broader scope beyond health care education," said Dr. Regina Toman, Director of the Clarkson College Healtcare and Education Leadership program. "Interprofessional leadership is becoming increasingly imperative as our world becomes more complex and interconnected," she said.

The Ed.D. in Interprofessional Leadership aligns with the Clarkson College Interprofessional Education (IPE) initiatives built upon national standards and core competencies of the Interprofessional Education Collaborative (IPEC). The 52-credit hour program is fully online with dissertation work embedded in the curriculum. Courses are offered in 7.5, 12, and 15-week sessions to support flexible and consistent student progression. In addition to coursework, students are required to pass a comprehensive exam, conduct an applied research study of their choice, and write and defend a dissertation.

Dr. Toman spoke on behalf of the Clarkson College faculty and staff who are eager to welcome their first group of students to the Ed.D. in Interprofressional Leadership program in fall 2023. "We are thrilled to offer this new doctoral program and look forward to helping students prepare to be the best leaders!"

Clarkson College Named One of Best in the State

INTELLIGENT.COM, a trusted resource for program rankings and higher education planning, has included Clarkson College on its list of the Best Online Colleges in Nebraska in 2023 as well as its list of the Best Colleges in Nebraska in 2023. The research identifies top schools in the state based on tuition costs, the number of credits required to graduate, and the online coursework delivery format.

Clarkson College was awarded Best Healthcare Institution on the final list of top colleges in the state. Intelligent.com implemented a unique methodology that ranks each institution on a scale from 0 to 100 across six categories. The scoring system compares each school according to tuition costs, admission, retention and graduation rates, faculty, and reputation, as well as the student resources provided for online students.

Studies show that obtaining a degree increases income substantially, with graduates earning 84% more than those with only high school diplomas or those without a completed GED. The percentage difference in earnings continues to grow with higher learning degrees such as master's, doctoral or professional degrees, with the unemployment rate decreasing to as much as 1.6% for those with a doctorate.

Program earns national recognition for the 12th year in a row

OMAHA, Neb.: U.S. News & World Report recently ranked Clarkson College in the top 100 Best Online Graduate Nursing Programs in the nation. The award marks the 12th year in a row that the Master of Science in Nursing (MSN) program has earned the distinction and speaks to the institution's continued tradition of excellence.

"We are proud to once again earn this honor from U.S. News & World Report," says Dr. Layna Himmelberg, Director of Graduate Nursing. "Each year, we strive to build upon a program that brings in committed students to work with dedicated faculty who are enthusiastic about building a health care workforce that will provide the best, most compassionate care to communities."

The MSN program allows working nurses the opportunity to earn their degree online and choose from flexible part- and full-time options. This allows students the option to build a course schedule that meets the needs of their professional and personal lives. The flexibility, along with the caring and dedicated faculty, is one of the main reasons why alumni choose to come back to Clarkson College to earn their advanced degree.

Stacey Poldervaart, MSN, RN, graduated with her Bachelor of Science in Nursing in 2018 and her MSN in 2020. She is currently pursuing a Doctor of Education (EdD) in Healthcare Education and Leadership with help from the Nurse Faculty Loan Program (NFLP) that provides students enrolled in the EdD and MSN in Nursing Education options up to 85% loan forgiveness.

"Making the decision to return to school after almost 10 years, and over the age of 45, was not easy," she says. "The time and financial commitment to further my education and career goals were things to consider as I have a family to care for as well. The NFLP offered through Clarkson College made this decision a bit easier. Being able to continue my education to reach my goals, knowing the financial burden of higher education would be lessened, motivated me to work harder and dream bigger."

Along with Nursing Education, the Graduate Nursing program offers specialties in Nursing Healthcare Administration, Family Nurse Practitioner, Psychiatric-Mental Health Nurse Practitioner and Adult Gerontology Acute Care Nurse Practitioner. Students can also enroll in post-MSN certificate options.

The ranking by U.S. News & World Report is driven by data collection through statistical questionnaires sent to institutions offering online master's degree programs. Programs must be accredited by either the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN) or the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE) and offer all required non-clinical coursework through internet-based distance education courses. The rankings recognize the best online graduate nursing programs based on five factors: engagement (30 percent), faculty credentials and training (20 percent), expert opinion (20 percent), services and technology (20 percent), and student excellence (10 percent).
